Head Teachers Message

Welcome to the first Newsletter of the 2016-2017 school session. As always, this mid-term newsletter is a celebration of the life and work of the school over the last 9 weeks.

Our senior students achieved outstanding results in the 2016 SQA diet of examinations. Currie CHS's results have been consistently above the City of Edinburgh average for many years and the school is one of the highest performing schools in the City. This year's results are the best the school has ever achieved with S4 results placing the school in second place for S4 results in the City. There are some particular individual achievements which led to the schools over-all success.

In S6: Andrew Sawkins, Dux for the 2015/16, achieved 3 'A' Advanced Highers: Damaris Tan, Proxime accessit dux for 2015/16, achieved 2 'A' Advanced Highers and 2 'A' Highers: Zoe Bates, Jamie Morton, Ronan Dance, Paige Morgan and John Wilhelm all achieved 3 'A' Advanced Highers.

50 of the S6 leavers have moved on to University places. The majority of these young people have moved into Science, Technology, Engineering and/or Maths related courses including one who has gone into Medicine and one into Veterinary Medicine. 54 of the S6 leavers have secured college places which include: pre apprenticeship courses in Construction; HND in Coaching and Developing Sport; HND in Makeup Artistry; HND in Acting and Performing; and NC in Furniture Crafts. 21 of the leavers have moved into employment or into another positive destination; these range from several Modern Apprenticeships to a football scholarship in the USA.

The opportunities available at CCHS allow all young people to acquire the highest academic qualifications as well as developing the key skills which will be required in our fast

changing world and which will prepare them for the jobs of tomorrow

CCHS joins the Solar Cooperative

Edinburgh Community Solar Cooperative is a community funded scheme which raised approximately £1.4 million in order to put solar panels on around 25 schools, community and leisure centers. Residents around the Edinburgh area were contacted and asked for an investment in the scheme for a 5% return on their investment.



This scheme aims to save the council around about 1000 tons of carbon dioxide each year and furthermore, should generate enough green energy to gather a £1m community fund. If that all wasn't enough, the panels will also play a part in trying to reduce Edinburgh's carbon emissions by 42% before the year 2020.

Our school, Currie Community High School was lucky enough to be approached by the Cooperative group and asked if we would take part in the scheme. We were actually the final school to be fitted with the panels and after the smooth, seamless and surprisingly quiet installation, the school held an opening ceremony for all the investors and council members, hosted by members of the Cooperative group. After a couple of photos on the school roof and some speeches from those involved, a cake (which was beautifully designed to look like a house with solar panels) was cut by CCHS Head Students: David Kong and Jenna Wayth.

This event attracted a lot of media attention in the form of the Edinburgh Evening News along with an STV news cameraman after which footage was shown on the 6 o'clock news.

Adopt an Artist in the Art Department

Topics such as university life and the skills needed to be a successful in the art world were covered including: the importance of hard work, communication skills and creativity Hannah presented a range of exciting folio work including both Design and expressive experiences. Hannah demonstrated with visuals/examples how to make a successful portfolio application to Art and Design degree courses.

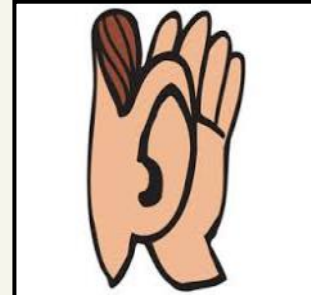
Listening Ear

Our Listening Ear service is run by Easter Smart and Jim Dewar, ministers of the Church of Scotland churches in Currie and Juniper Green and chaplains to Currie Community High School. They offer students a confidential, informal, in-school counseling service which takes place every Thursday afternoon.

“There are all kinds of things that might bother you, for which you might want someone to talk to. We can be a person to talk to who is not your teacher, nor your pals, but who is able and willing to listen in a concerned but slightly disconnected way. We are willing to listen to you talk through whatever it is that bothers you and to offer help and support as you deal with these issues. We might offer some advice which you can take or leave; all of this is completely confidential. There is nothing religious about this and we are not out to convert anyone to our view of life and the world. We meet in the room next to the Head Teacher’s room, off the corridor, so no-one sees you waiting for us; you have up to 30 minutes with us; one of us will be in school every week.

In our ministry elsewhere we come across people in all kinds of situations; we are offering that experience and a little expertise to the life of the school. “

- These students are planning to deliver Tobacco Education lessons to S1 students and are working towards creating a school policy to support the work they did with ASSIST and ensure CCHS is a Smoke Free School.
- Mr Watson's S3 Graphics class are in the process of designing smoke free promotional materials. The winning designs will be professionally printed and displayed around the school.
- Avril Browne our NHS Stop Smoking Facilitator will be offering support sessions in school starting from October.

S5/6 University applications for 2017

Information for Parents



Our current S6 students and S5 students who have expressed an interest, have started their UCAS applications.

All students wishing to apply to university for next year have had talks from Edinburgh University and LEAPS (Lothians Equal Access Programme for Schools) during PSE classes. They have also been issued with a UCAS pack which includes step-by-step instructions for applying and support materials for writing their Personal Statements. They have also spent some time in PSE planning their Personal Statements with support from staff.

Although the UCAS submission date is in January, we have set our own CCHS deadlines which have been given to the students. We have given students a deadline of **7th December** to have their UCAS applications fully completed and sent to us (Pupil Support Leaders).

(Please note some students applying to the 15th Oct UCAS deadline have already had support and submitted their applications)

Other deadlines for you to be aware of:

- **23rd Sept** - All students should have created their online UCAS account & completed the Personal Details, Additional Info, Education and Employment sections.
- **28th Sept** - 1st draft of Personal Statement to Pupil Support Leader
- **26th Oct** - 2nd draft of Personal Statement to Pupil Support Leader (further drafts will be given individual deadlines thereafter)
- **23rd Nov** - All sections on UCAS account fully completed

7th Dec - All applications fully completed and sent electronically to Pupil Support Leader.

Please note students are welcome to hand in work ahead of these deadlines and submit their application to UCAS earlier than outlined above. Students will liaise with the own PSLs about this.

Please make note of these dates and support your son/daughter to meet these deadlines set.

2017 College Applications

Students wishing to apply to college for Aug 2017 will receive talks and support in January. College applications open in January and close in April. Students will be given 1 to 1 support with their applications if they require it.

Cool, Calm & Connected – Peer Education Programme

S5 students were given the exciting opportunity to train as Peer Educators for the Cool, Calm and Connected programme this term. The team completed a two day training course designed for young people of secondary school age as part of The City of Edinburgh Council's Growing Confidence Project, funded by the Big Lottery Fund. The course aims to bring young people together on a personal journey to explore what influences mental health and emotional well-being, and supports them in making relevant links to their own lives. It is hoped that they will ultimately use the information to make positive choices about how they manage their own mental health and emotional well-being, as well as how they influence that of other people's.

Our newly trained S5 Peer Educators will be delivering the programme to our S1 classes from Tuesday 20th of September.

preparing young people for the world of work

Six S6 students completed a four-week paid internship over the summer holidays as part of the Career Ready programme. Career Ready is a UK wide charity linking employers with schools and colleges to open up the world of work to young people. It aims to give students the confidence, skills and networks to achieve their potential. Students are matched up with an industry mentor who works with them for two years. Students then undertake their internship at the mentor's place of work. This year our students worked at a variety of industries including RBS, the Scottish Government and Sopra Steria. One of the students, Gabriella Cooper, completed her internship at Lockheed Martin, and she found it extremely valuable, as shown below: "For my internship I got to have a four week work placement at Lockheed Martin, an advanced technology company based at The Gyle. I was there with two other Career Ready students from different schools and we were given a project to investigate how to improve the office communication between employees and other offices in Scotland. My main role in the team was to create a survey and analyse the results.

We then came up with suitable recommendations that we felt would improve communication, and presented these to the whole office. I also got the opportunity to work-shadow which gave me a one to one experience of the main job roles in the organisation. I really enjoyed my placement and feel I developed a lot of valuable skills, for example working in a team, managing myself and also how to communicate clearly with others. Overall I would highly recommend the Career Ready programme."

Six of the S5 students have recently been recruited onto the Career Ready programme, and this week have met their mentors at the launch event. This was held on Friday at the RBS Headquarters at Gogarburn. The students have been matched with mentors in a variety of businesses including RBS, Diageo, CGI, the NHS, Edinburgh City Council and The Scottish Parliament. The launch event was a big success and students and mentors are very much looking forward to working together. The students on the programme are: Adelaide Munro, Jordi Montgomery, Erika Palmer, Craig Haggart, Daniel Musiyiwa and Ali Hussain. Good luck to them all over the next two years.

We have allocated different roles to each member of the group to cover the essential business functions, including Sales + Marketing, IT, Operations and Finance/ Legal.

At the start of September some members of the team attended a training session at St George's School for Girls. We were delivered talks from successful entrepreneurs including Niall Grant, CEO of WorkBase HR who gave valuable insights into running the business. We also got to look round stalls from a variety of businesses ranging from handmade entrepreneurial ideas to innovative global businesses.

Although we have only recently started out we have already made some big decisions including choice of product, product design, raising capital and sourcing suppliers. This week we plan to set up our business bank account and to start issuing share certificates to our investors. Next week, we will order our stock and then we will go into production of the candles. We would like to say a huge thank you to Mrs Marriot who has given us amazing training in how to make the candles, as well as to Mrs Matthewson for all her valuable business insights. We will be selling our candles at the PiP Christmas Fair, as well as the Young Enterprise-organised Christmas market in Tollcross. News from Chogoria, Kenya

Following up on the article in our last newsletter, we have sent donations to various organisations in Chogoria from the money raised by our S6 group who had planned to go to Chogoria in 2014. We have heard back from all the recipients and I have copied below some of their words of thanks to our school and community for our support.

Santis Ileri, the Headteacher of Chogoria Complex Primary School wrote ' I was very delighted to note that Currie Community has decided to support Chogoria Complex Primary School once more. Kindly pass our appreciation.. '. She told us that the decision on how to spend the £500 we sent was to be discussed with the staff and school board members. You can see some of the items they bought in the super photo below ! Pupils and staff are holding tea urns, cutlery, plates and cooking pots - essential items for preparing meals for the children at school. They have also ordered curtains which provide shade in classrooms, tablecloths and are undertaking some repairs.

We also sent a donation to Faraja Self Help group . Faraja is a Kiswahili word meaning relief or comfort (removal of stress or discomfort) and one of the founders Millicent Garama wrote to thank us for our donation. 'Hello All, on behalf of the Faraja Self Help Board and



the children, I sincerely thank you for your support to the children in our community. ... These funds will go a long way in supporting our organization meet its objectives in support to orphans and vulnerable children. We are so grateful and hope that any time you come to Chogoria you can visit our center so that you have an opportunity to interact with both the board and the children. Finally we sent a donation to Chogoria High School to their hardship fund which is used to give small grants to assist some pupils at the school to continue their education. Pupil Medication – Quick Overview for Parents

Some parents may not be aware of our procedures around pupil medication at Currie Community High School so here is a quick overview for you.

1. At the beginning of the school year (August) parents are required to provide any medication that a pupil needs during the school day. This should be high priority for pupils with chronic conditions such as asthma and allergies.
2. No medication of any kind can be administered by high school staff without a parental request for pupils under 16, or a pupil request for those aged 16 to 18. A request, whether for prescribed or non-prescribed medication, requires a form to be completed and signed. All forms can be sourced from the school nurse.
3. Prescribed medication must be supplied to the school by a parent and in the dispensing container with the original pharmacy label detailing the pupil's name, date of birth, etc.
4. Any change to prescribed medication whether size of dose or type means a new form must be completed by parent/carer and returned to the School Nurse as soon as possible.
5. Medication may need replenished. When this is the case the school nurse will contact parent/carer via letter to request more medication. Please provide this as soon as possible so that pupils do not miss having their medication administered.
6. Pupils who want to and are able to self-administer medication may do so only with parents'/carers' and the school's permission. A form must be completed and signed before self-administration is undertaken at school. Please be aware this includes paracetamol and ibuprofen.
7. At the end of each school year all medication must be collected from the school by the parents/carers. This includes epi-pens and inhalers. A letter will be sent home requesting parents/carers do this by the last day of term. No medication will be kept in school during the summer holidays therefore any medication not picked up will be handed into the local pharmacy for disposal.

Looking forward we will be adding the necessary forms to the school website so that parents will have easy access as well as the above information. Late Detentions

Late Detentions will be resuming after the October holiday with some slight amendments to our previous format.

Infectious Illnesses

As you may be aware from media reports James Gillespie HS has encountered an outbreak of measles. Whilst these instances are quite unusual it is important we minimise the spread of infectious illnesses, like measles and the norovirus. We can proactively do 3 things to prevent spread of these types of illnesses.

- ◆ Be aware of symptoms (see below)
- ◆ Where you suspect a pupil has an illness that is infectious they are kept out of school for the appropriate duration.
- ◆ Please notify the school as soon as you are aware of infectious illness such as norovirus and measles as protocol dictates that we are required to report these to the NHS Lothian's Health Protection Team
